

Problem: The higher rates of Black women dying in preventable pregnancy-related deaths than any other group is not another health problem, it is a maternal health crisis. Virginia's rate is higher than the national average. It demands a critical response from Virginia legislators to implement proven strategies and new paradigms of maternal care delivery to mitigate preventable deaths.





